Hope for a Better Future Vocational Training Institute Opens in Cameroon

Overview

Hope for a Better Future Vocational Training Institute (HOBEFI), with authorization from the Ministry of Employment and Vocational Training, Cameroon, is in partnership with Master Peace International, Turing Foundation, and Noorderpoort to prepare students for a better life with a three-year comprehensive practical training in very useful trades and skills.

It seeks to provide sound practical training to youths with much priority to young women. It also seeks to impart to her students sound moral and spiritual values. The Institute is aimed at inculcating in the students a high sense of civic responsibility through community participation in its activities; for example, peace building and employment creation.

HOBEFI provides skill development through technical and vocational training in order to equip youths with relevant skills demanded by the labor market. Upon completion of the vocational courses, students will be attached to the respective companies for industrial training to acquire hands-on skills and experience. This exposure to the world of work is expected to increase their employability and subsequently, sustainability.

The project was jointly developed by Ngo Banfogha (founder of H4BF) and Dorothée J.C. Meijer (MasterPeace Foundation's African's clubs coordinator). MasterPeace is a young, positive, international peace movement. They are active in more than 40 countries. The project was funded by Turing Foundation and Noorderpoor, who will assist in developing the training courses and also train trainers who will manage the center. We are still in need of both funding and technical partners to fill gaps in various sectors.

Our Target Group

Our target group is youths, who will subsequently establish businesses and create employment opportunities for other youth in the Renewable Energy value chain, ICT industry, Textiles, and Agriculture through courses like Web and **Training** continued on page 3

Fair Use Law: https://copyright. gov/fair-use/more-info.html

Fair use is a legal doctrine that promotes freedom of expression by permitting the unlicensed use of copyright-protected works in certain circumstances. Section 107 of the Copyright Act provides the statutory framework for determining whether something is a fair use and identifies certain types of uses - such as criticism, comment, news reporting, teaching, scholarship, and research - as examples of activities that may qualify as fair use. Section 107 calls for consideration of the following four factors in evaluating a question of fair use:

(1) Purpose and character of the use, including whether the use is of a commercial nature or is for nonprofit educational purposes.

(2) Nature of the copyrighted work.

(3) Amount and substantiality of the portion used in relation to the copyrighted work as a whole.

(4) Effect of the use upon the potential market for or value of the copyrighted work. Fair Use Logo

App Development, Computer Networking & Maintenance, Fashion and Designing, Database Administration, and Agriculture in order to enable them become better entrepreneurs.

Our Objectives

• Promote the welfare of youths with priorities given to women and girls, especially vulnerable ones like Persons with Disabilities.

• Train youths from the ages of 16 to 30 in self-reliant life skills, so that they will be able to carry out economic activities which enhance their self-esteem and enable them to be part of the mainstream of the development of their communities.

• Provide start up initiatives to graduates, to enable effective integration and job creation abilities in their various communities.

• Train them in basic management skills, record keeping, and entrepreneurial skills.

• Continuous monitoring and evaluation of graduates for some years for any pos-

sible backfilling.

• Set up a revolving micro finance scheme to benefit ex-trainees with symbolic interest.

Expected Results

After the training, we expect the trainees to:

a) Be well equipped in at least one life skill that fully empowers them economically and socially;

b) Be armed with leadership and basic management skills to run a good business;c) Start up a self-owned workshop.

Complete application form. A copy of GCE O/L or Probatoire (at least 4 papers). A copy of GCE A/L or Baccalaureate (at least 2 Papers). Copy of Birth Certificate. Two color passport-sized photographs.

Duration of Training

The training duration ranges between one and three years depending on the trade and on the learning ability of each trainee.

Team 54 Project International Founder Goes to Bat for Youth

Special thanks to Hawa Taylor-Kamara Diallo, Jayathma Wickramanayake, our UN Youth Envoy, who was instrumental in expanding more Africa voices at the UN.

I must appreciate Jasmin Akter Promi, our Executive Director, who together helped me prepare our organization's position paper, and will also want to acknowledge the ex-President and current president of the United Nations Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC), Rhonda King, and Mona Juul, of Norway, respectively.

Together these wonderful women, have reignited the importance of collaborative multilateralism. And I share the sentiment of H.E Juul that should accelerate the implementation of the Addis Ababa Action Agenda and the global partnership framework for sustainable development.

Special thanks to Mr. Liu Zhenmin, the Under-Secretary-General for Economic and Social Affairs, who advises the UN Secretary-General on the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) and truly has been reaching out to non-traditional partners among civil society organizations. In his World Health Day speech this year he again reminded the world about the importance of inclusive participatory agendas in any governance model practice, and the importance of social equity for all which the SDGs champion.

Being featured on the UN website (especially for the views I passionately share) during international engagement is indeed wonderful, though it's over one year old.

I remember yesterday what I said to world leaders especially about the state of things in Africa, especially in my homeland, Nigeria. SDGs' effects still need to go beyond the paper and adoption which all African leaders have signed up to in 2015, yet none of them are looking likely to meet up to 30% goal. Entire West Africa will not be able to meet 20% of the mandate. Solely because this crop of leaders wants to seat in power and run ethnoreligious agendas rather than the people's mandate which the SDGs embrace.

Consequently, successes of the SDGs will require direct cooperation and collaboration with the people impacted, especially when foreign governments want to assist.

While the national government observes and creates a conducive environment, more direct engagement and intervention must now be directed to the various national and local civil society groups, cooperating entities, educational institutions, and youth who have organized themselves into cooperatives.

This is what will allow us to build back better during this Covid-19 era, though the pandemic further exposed the hypocrisy that certain leaders often express when they engage the UN and other funding partners to the detriment of their people.

I want to appreciate other organizations within the UN who have been so helpful in getting the African Youth voice out in the open, hoping that someone will hear and focus attention on what's happening on the continent, especially as it pertains to the future that we fear is being mortgaged for a few foreign corporate crumbs.

Thanks to all the agency UNICEF Côte d'Ivoire Sophie Chavanel; I know you are in UNICEF Congo now; thanks a lot.

Big Advances on Climate in Global Courts

Our Children's Trust: June 2, 2021

It was a big month for global climate litigation!

Last month, our global partners and allies – two of whom utilized the groundbreaking youth rights-based climate litigation strategy pioneered by Our Children's Trust – achieved court victories in three different global domestic courts: Germany, the Netherlands, and Australia. This is important news because these court decisions are building the necessary judicial precedents for the responsibility of governments to uphold and protect human rights, children's rights, and climate justice.

Years in the Making!

Our Children's Trust has spent many years collaborating and consulting with fellow attorneys around the globe on these and similar cases and are delighted today to celebrate their victories. **Congratulations** to our European and Australian partner attorneys and their courageous clients!

Continuing on the Path...

As we celebrate these important wins, we're also continuing to advance youthled litigation in federal and state courts in the United States as well as in other global jurisdictions like Canada, Mexico, Uganda, India, and Pakistan.

Importantly, in our U.S. federal case, Juliana v. United States, later this month, we and our youth clients will have our first settlement conference with the U.S. government and a settlement judge for confidential talks to discuss if and how we might come to agreement on resolving the youths' constitutional claims, working together to protect our young people's rights to a safe future.

Juliana is also scheduled for oral argument on June 25 before Judge Aiken and we will continue on our quest to secure another trial date (in case we don't reach a settlement agreement) to present evidence in open court of the government's ongoing energy system policies and practices that are known to endanger and harm our children.

A Clarion Call to U.S. Courts All three of the courts in Germany, The Netherlands, and Australia embraced the right of people to *be in court* on these vital legal and factual climate questions. That is access to justice. Courts in the United States should similarly open their doors and engage with these vital questions of human rights and public harm. The courts become even more politicized when they take a seat on a question of fundamental rights and science without first considering and weighing the evidence, thus letting the dominant political faction's actions go unchecked.

It is also critical that the U.S. courts join these other democratic nations in protecting human rights and abating their contributions to the climate crisis. The U.S. is an absolutely necessary partner in global climate mitigation, if for no other reason than the U.S. is responsible for 25% of the world's historic emissions! U.S. courts must step up alongside their counterparts around the world if we are to accomplish a science-based remedy to the global climate crisis.

Resilience is Key

It is never easy being a pioneer. In our case, the waves we've helped to launch are landing in other nations but are taking longer to reach our own shores. The unparalleled politicization of the climate crisis in the U.S. and the vast amount of money and power invested in keeping fossil fuels as the foundation of our energy pyramid means we have to be that much more persistent in pursuit of justice. But judges

are doing their jobs across the continents and those court decisions, just like Judge Aiken's first *Juliana* decision in 2016, will have ripple effects around the world. **With your support**, we will pursue and achieve a durable solution to the climate crisis for our youth clients here in the U.S. and with our partners around the world.

Today, we congratulate the efforts of the **German**, **Dutch**, and **Australian** courts, claimants, and counsel who made these court rulings possible, and we look forward to the day ahead when our global allies will be able to celebrate and salute the efforts of the U.S. judiciary to protect U.S. children with a lasting science-based solution to the climate crisis in a country most responsible.

17 "Red" States in U.S. to Fight Juliana Kids

Dear Friends,

More than 6 years in, Juliana v U.S. is still the most consequential climate case on the dockets!

Attorneys from 17 "red" states (Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, Georgia, Indiana, Louisiana, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Texas, Utah, and West Virginia) are so worried that Juliana is going to upset the monied status quo of the fossil fuel industry that they have just announced their intention to join forces, fight against children's constitutional rights to a safe climate, and obstruct any settlement that might be reached with the Biden administration. For years, huge entrenched interests have been trying, unsuccessfully, to beat down Juliana v. U.S. But Juliana is as poised for success as ever. Just look at the ground-breaking history of the 21 youth plaintiffs' continued perseverance against the most formidable of opponents:

For more than 6 years:

The U.S. federal government has tried every trick in the book to fight these children and keep historical government wrongdoing and climate science evidence from coming to light in open court, but:

The youth have persevered, winning nearly every defense brought against them, and U.S. District Judge Ann Aiken has now ordered the federal government to enter into settlement negotiations later this month, and will thereafter decide how the youth's case will proceed in her court.

4 Years Ago

Nearly all of the fossil fuel industry intervened in Juliana v. U.S. through their trade associations to fight these children and keep climate science evidence from coming to light in open court, but:

The youth persevered, the fossil fuel industry gave up their intervention and left the case, and the youth's case continued to move forward.

And just Yesterday

The attorneys general of 17 "red" states decided to use their concentrated and well-funded political power to intervene in the case, protect the fossil fuel industry's monied interests, and obstruct these young people's efforts to protect their health, their safety, and their future by settlement or



finally a trial and judgment in their case. By seeking to stop Juliana, these state governments only harm the children of their own states, which are also ravaged by the climate crisis. However,

We are optimistic the youth will persevere again, and their case will continue its progress toward trial in open court where all the truths will finally be heard or to a meaningful settlement of their claims.

All of the defendants and intervenors over the last 6 years (the federal government, the fossil fuel industry and now these ten red 17 state AGs) know that Juliana v. U.S. will lead to a safe energy system grounded in renewable energy and based on scientific prescriptions for a safe climate. But that safe energy system will require transformation of the status quo fossil fuel based system in which all of these defendants and intervenors are so politically over-invested.

These government and corporate interests continue to leverage their clout and money as hard and long as they can to keep evidence of climate science out of court, to deny the equal rights of children, and to stop Juliana v. U.S., despite the fact that the case is so clearly:

- Grounded in science,
- Brought by kids to save their futures,

• Cemented in fundamental constitutional rights,


• Able to reveal hard evidence of the egregious actions of our governments that have caused the climate crisis.

Jim, our staff scientist and restoration ecologist at Biodiversity for a Livable Climate, will be leading his fourth online course, Biodiversity 4: Fungi, Forests, and Living Shorelines, over 12 weeks from June 16th to September 1st.

As those of us who have learned from Jim before can attest, his deep experience and unique perspective on ecosystem restoration, combined with his thoughtfulness and ability to lead illuminating discussions on complex topics make for an incredibly enriching learning experience. If you had a chance to join any of his previous three courses, we hope you'll return to explore fungal networks, soil health, and forest and coastal ecosystems. If you're new, this is an excellent opportunity to join our team of budding planetary restorers. No prior experience is necessary, and there will be plenty of people from earlier classes, like myself, to help bring new class members into the fold.

We will meet for 12 weeks on Wednesdays, starting on June 16th, and there will be two sessions to accommodate participants' schedules – from 1 to 3 p.m. ET and 7 to 9 p.m. ET.

Course Description

How did nature create the great ecosystems that have supported our many diverse human communities? How can we in turn learn from natural processes to support life and the carbon, water, and nutrient cycles that regulate our planet?

In the first part of this course, we will focus on fungi and their role in forest ecosystems. We will learn how mycorrhizal fungi and other forest life work together to share nutrients and nurture a soil microbiome. A healthy soil microbiome acts like an immune system for the forest much like our personal gut microbiomes act in our own bodies. Understanding the symbiotic relationships between organisms is crucial to carrying out effective conservation and restoration efforts.

In the second part of this course, we will turn to oceans and the creation of living shorelines. In particular, we will investigate the coastal ecosystems on our North American East Coast, including Maine, Chesapeake Bay, and the Coral Coast in the Florida Keys, using Rachel Carson's *The Edge of the Sea*, which describes these areas from her perspective in the 1950s when these systems were still largely intact. In this book, Carson focused on the life cycles of invertebrates and the kelps and algae that start the ocean food web via photosynthesis. We will look at ways to restore coastlines even if seas rise several feet in coming decades.

As we face the reality of our planetary health, some of our most important tasks are to restore forests and wetlands to act as the powerful carbon sinks they can be, and to create living shorelines to buffer against rising seas and foster flourishing marine ecosystems. We will use our readings and discussions as a jumping off point to envision the restoration projects that can protect and regenerate living systems into the future.

Martin Luther King, Jr. and the History of the Poor People's Campaign

In 1968 Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and many others called for a "revolution of values" in America and started the first Poor People's Campaign in 1968.

They sought to build a broad, fusion movement that could unite poor and impacted communities across the country. Their name was a direct cry from the underside of history: The first Poor People's Campaign in 1968.

Today, the Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival has picked up this unfinished work. https://www. poorpeoplescampaign.org/

In December 1967, Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. announced plans for a "Poor People's Campaign." It was a new effort to unite all those in the United States who were struggling to survive, in order to demand together their rights to "life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." In announcing the campaign, Rev. Dr. King said:


"The dispossessed of this nation – the poor, both white and Negro – live in a cruelly unjust society. They must organize a revolution against that injustice, not against the lives of the persons who are their fellow citizens, but against the structures through which the society is refusing to take means which have been called for, and which are at hand, to lift the load of poverty...

"There are millions of poor people in this country with very little, or even nothing to lose. If they can be helped to take action together, they will do so with a freedom and a power that will be a new and unsettling force in our complacent national life." Calling for a new Poor People's Cam-

paign for today means taking up Rev. Dr King's mission, and organizing to unite those of us whose very lives are threatened and treated as worthless by the systems and structures that dominate our society.

Developing unity among the poor, in the U.S. and globally, begins by learning about, listening to, and building trust with as many poor people's organizations and movements as possible around the country and the world. We want to develop a shared assessment of the global problems we face: problems of unemployment, economic insecurity, and low wages; of war and violence; of racial, national, ethnic, and gender-based oppression; and of ecological devastation and the poisoning of our communities. And we want to build forms of mutual support and collective action that can bring us together to solve those problems. Reflections on the Palestine/Israel Situation

[follow up to last month's message on page 27]

The crisis [with Palestine and Israel] seems to continue unabated. If this present outbreak should come to a halt, I think the picture will nonetheless be very much changed for the future. (1) It looks to me as though the Palestinians - even to the degree that they are currently separated from one other (i.e. by placement in different administrative units) - and their leadership - will be much more likely to speak out with a single – and much louder – voice. (2) I think this outbreak has simultaneously weakened overall levels of support for Israel while strengthening protest and opposition movements on a world-wide basis. (3) As part of that, I think that different countries, as well as international organizations, will feel more fully justified in looking at Israeli policies and practices more closely – and with a much sharper eye – especially from the point of view of human rights violations. And finally, (4) I think that everyone, at this point, will recognize with much greater emphasis and clarity the absolute need to chart a pathway forward towards a peaceful and effective resolution of this conflict for once and for all.

It has also helped me see that we may need (or want) to break that 'pathway' down into different phases – rather than trying to do everything at the same time. In other words, we (i.e. the combatants and members of the international community) can start by insisting that Israel comply with accepted international standards in all its dealings with the Palestinian people (i.e. regardless of whether 'within' Israel or in the territories it has occupied). We should make clear what these standards are, and make sure they are observed, with distinct penalties being imposed for any future non-compliance.

Then, once this stage is complete, we can move forward into a second phase where we deal with and negotiate all future issues. That would include resettlement, reparations, legal equivalency, and investment in the Palestinian 'infrastructure' such as housing, education, medical facilities, employment opportunities, as well as sports, arts, recreation, and tourism. And at that point, the decision should be made as to whether to go with one state or two – and/ or some other sequencing of the two.

So those are my thoughts at the moment. You should let me know, if and when you have the time, what your insights might be! Thanks.

[second email]

It's raining nicely here today – and imagine it is where you are too – helping to keep everything nice and green.

I don't think I knew that you were on a Kibbutz (where I'll bet rain was a rarity, if in fact it ever occurred while you were there) though you probably mentioned your visit when we were all having conversations on the topic.

As for what I am doing, Iona – I think it's mostly a matter of writing letters and emails to people (including foreign embassies, U.S. legislators, and the White House) and trying to keep myself somewhat educated on the issue. We also did have a seminar (of sorts) on the issue at the library a couple of years back, I would say – with a focus on how differently the American and European media present the issues.

This time it's no different. Most American media (and the Administration) say that the Palestinians started the conflict by hurling rockets into Israel and that it was only within their rights that the Israelis should respond in kind; while the Europeans are more likely to look at the provocative actions taken by the Israelis as to what really instigated the crisis. "Democracy Now," however, definitely falls into the European model.

The way news is handled and presented makes a huge difference, as you well know. But I do think that more and more Americans are getting wise to the difference as time goes on, and wanting to take actions urging our country to take a new course.

Right now, as I think implied in the earlier e-mail, I feel we are all in fact at a really new "starting point." And I think that is good. People have a clearer idea of what is involved, who is doing what, and

the vital importance of finding that new and better way forward. So to your question, I think what I am actually doing is "taking stock" and "reassessing."

Regardless of what we do, I think it has to be "non-partisan" and "forward looking." I keep on hoping that more Israelis – and quickly – will see that their only hope for real peace and security will come from making a real admission of equality with their Palestinian neighbors.

[third email]

I don't have much in the way of firsthand information as to whether young Israelis are more interested in engaging in peace-making with the Palestinians than preceding generations, but I honestly don't think so. I get the impression that the spectrum of political views crosses pretty evenly there from one generation to the next, meaning that there are probably the same proportion of 'peace-oriented' activists in each new generation as in the one before. But I could be wrong.

Did you ever hear of Martin Buber – or read any of his writing? He was originally from Poland (I'm pretty sure) – and emigrated to Palestine in the 1920's. He was very happy there, largely because he enjoyed the 'intercultural' experience of meeting people with many backgrounds – including the Palestinians he met. He was an early advocate for creating a 'multicultural' society in Palestine, but was swiftly outflanked by the more nationalistic minded, heavy-duty Zionists. I think he foresaw the many problems that the colonialiststyle viewpoints of some of those Zionists were likely to lead to down the road.

Don't you suppose the Arabs living near you in the Negev were Bedouins? I would think so. I wouldn't suppose they would originally have considered themselves to be Palestinians *per se*; but by now they might in view of everything that has taken place since then. Not a happy story for any of them.

[fourth email June 3]

BBC newscasts (as seen via PBS) have been providing some good coverage on all this over the past few days. I am hopeful that this new coalition will go through as proposed because basically I think it is a very healthy development.

The coalition at the outset may look quite unwieldy, but, somewhat oddly, I think it will be workable. Primarily because its members will now be forced to 'work together' just in order to stay in power. So instead of posturing and making great speeches to appeal to their own base, each party will now (more than likely) have to adopt a lower – and more pragmatic – tone in order to maintain its relationships with all the other parties.

Which is exactly what I think is most needed at this time. I also think that including elected Arab (i.e. Palestinian) representatives sets a perfect precedent for future dealings between Israelis and Palestinians because now (for once) working relationships between the two groups will need to be established that are based on power equality – not separation – as well as mediated out of a consideration for genuine concerns that are felt in common.

So that's how I look at it. Thanks very much for sending the article. And let me know – if you have the time – how you are reacting to all this.

I just wish you would add some of your own thoughts and observations to the mix, especially in light of your own experiences in the region!

Excerpt from Iona's Memoir About Her Work on a Kibbutz in Israel in 1989

Why On Earth Did I Work on a Kibbutz?

My former husband was Jewish, so I had become somewhat familiar with Jewish culture. I was spending my spare time trying to save a farm in New Jersey, which was losing a farm a day back then. A small group of us wanted to buy one farm, create a community land trust, and build a few small solar homes clustered in a corner of the land, while farming and preserving the rest of it. That dream never worked out but I spent three years trying to pull it all together. Once I moved to Maryland to marry John, the project collapsed.

Below are excerpts from my journal.

I worked on a Kibbutz in the Negev desert in Israel because I felt so stupid when I described Homeland and people asked in smart-alecky tones, "Well, have you ever lived in a community?"

"No."

"Have you ever worked on a farm?" "No."

I was embarrassed by my ignorance and decided to develop one answer, "Yes," to future interrogations by working in a farming community. Please don't ask how I decided to go all the way to Israel to gain experience I could probably have gained right here. I could not tell you. *My first impressions of Israel were weird* – so many armed soldiers in the Tel Aviv airport; then I took a bus to the kibbutz and was startled to see the entrance guarded by a man with a gun....

The way kibbutz life is structured, with shared work and shared resources, made so much more sense to me than anything I'd experienced as a working, suburban housewife in the U.S. I had SO MUCH FREE TIME – I mean, totally free! Once my job was done, I was free. Others did the food shopping, cooking, dish washing (except, of course, when that was MY job), laundry, ironing, even child care in the central Children's House, which resembled a miniature version of a normal home and reminded me of Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs with little beds, little sinks, little toilets, little tables, little chairs.....

I was frustrated by not having assignments which furthered my cause of learning more about farming. When I realized that washing dishes wasn't supporting my vision and purpose, I asked if there was farm work I could do. In addition to the dairy, one man told me I could get up early and cut off chicks' beaks. The idea STILL turns my stomach. I'd rather do dishes.

But because I was in my 40s, they came up with an alternate plan for me and placed me in Seri-craft, the silk-screening business they had set up for "older" women. Insulted, I took it anyhow. Among other things, we decorated beautiful tablecloths with matching napkins on high-quality, durable, brightly-colored cotton with pomegranates (symbolic of something). I brought back three sets as gifts.

It was through one of the women who worked there that I was able to arrange my weekend "vacation" in a Waldorf^{*} kibbutz in Nazareth. Since Kibbutz Shoval was in the Negev Desert in the South and Harduf was in the North, I took a bus. It was fascinating to see Bedouin (Arab nomads) encampments along the way.

When I reached Harduf, it was dusk and the first person I met reminded me of Moses – a slim, serious and seriously bearded figure standing on a hill peacefully gazing out over the valley.

Zohar showed me around and became my teacher about Waldorf ways for the two days I was there....

Despite Risks, Climate Activists Lead Fight Against Oil Giant's Drilling Projects in Uganda

Deep Green Resistence News Service Editor's Note: The company has already sold a handful of its onshore oil blocks over the past 10 years, citing the need to cut risk due to community unrest and continued sabotage attacks on its oil installations

These blocks had been snapped up by Nigerian indigenous operators including Seplat Petroleum, Aiteo E&P, First Hydrocarbons and NPDC. This article originally appeared in Common Dreams.

"We cannot drink oil. This is why we cannot accept the construction of the East African Crude Oil Pipeline."

Climate campaigners in Africa and around the world on Friday continued demonstrations against Total, with activists accusing the French oil giant of ecocide, human rights violations, and greenwashing in connection with fossil fuel projects in Uganda.

On the 145th week of Fridays for Future climate strike protests, members of the movement in Uganda global allies drew attention to the harmful effects of fossil fuel development on the environment, ecosystems, communities, and livelihoods.

Friday's actions followed protests at Total petrol stations in Benin, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Egypt, Ghana, Kenya, Nigeria, Togo, and Uganda on Tuesday – celebrated each year as Africa Day – against the East African Crude Oil Pipeline (EACOP), now under construction, and the Mozambique Liquefied Natural Gas project.

"Total's fossil fuel developments pose grave risks to protected environments, water sources, and wetlands in the Great Lakes and East Africa regions," said Andre Moliro, an activist from the Democratic Republic of the Congo, during Tuesday's pan-African protests. "Communities have been raising concerns on the impact of oil extraction on Lake Albert fisheries and the disastrous consequences of an oil spill in Lake Victoria, that would affect millions of people who rely on the two lakes for their livelihoods, watersheds for drinking water, and food production," he added.

In Uganda, opposing oil development – an expected multi-billion-dollar boon to the landlocked nation's economy – can be risky business. On Monday, police in Buliisa arrested Ugandan human rights defender Maxwell Atuhura and Italian journalist Federica Marsi.

According to *Energy Voice*, Atuhura – who works with the African Institute for Energy Governance (AFIEGO), one of half a dozen NGOs that have pursued legal action against Total – and Marsi were about to meet with local community members when they were apprehended.

edly told to leave the oil region "before bad things happen." She was briefly rearrested later in the day. Atuhura remains in police custody. The World Organization Against Torture has issued an urgent appeal for intervention in his case.

United Nations special rapporteurs and international human rights groups have previously expressed serious concern over abuses perpetrated against land defenders and journalists in Uganda.

Despite the risks, actions against EA-COP and the related Tilenga Development Project continue.

"We cannot drink oil. This is why we cannot accept the construction of the East African Crude Oil Pipeline," Ugandan climate justice activist Vanessa Nakate, founder of the Rise Up Movement, said during the Africa Day action. "It is going to cause massive displacement of people [and the] destruction of ecosystems and wildlife habitats...We have no future in extraction of oil because it only means destroying the livelihoods of the people and the planet," Nakate added. "It is time to choose people above pipelines. It is time to rise up for the people and the planet."

If completed, the \$3.5 billion, nearly 900-mile EACOP will transport up to 230,000 barrels of crude oil per day from fields in the Lake Albert region of western Uganda through the world's longest electrically heated pipeline to the Tanzanian port city of Tanga on the Indian Ocean.

In partnership with China National Offshore Oil Corporation (CNOOC) and the Uganda National Oil Company (UNOC), Total is also leading the Tilenga Development Project, which involves the drilling of 400 wells in dozens of locations, including inside the richly biodiverse Murchison Falls National Park.

Total says the project will "generate a positive net impact on biodiversity," a claim vehemently rejected by environmentalists.

"Imagine a tropical version of the Alaskan oil pipeline," environmental author Fred Pearce wrote of EACOP last year. "Only longer. And passing through critical elephant, lion, and chimpanzee habitats and 12 forest reserves, skirting Africa's largest lake, and crossing more than 200 rivers and thousands of farms before reaching the Indian Ocean – where its version of the Exxon Valdez disaster would pour crude oil into some of Africa's most biodiverse mangroves and coral reefs."

Although Total claims it chose the EACOP route to "minimize the number of residents relocated," local residents and international NGOs say the pipeline's impact will be anything but minimal.

According to *Mongabay*, more than 12,000 families will be displaced from their ancestral lands to make way for the pipeline, two-thirds of which will pass through agricultural zones. Farmers in the pipeline's path and the Lake Albert oil region have joined civil society groups and international organizations in voicing their opposition to the EACOP and Tilenga projects.

The #StopEACOP coalition, which is made up of local and international activists and organizations, is attempting to block funding of the project by appealing to banks, investors, and insurance companies. A March open letter signed by more than 250 groups urged 25 commercial banks to not finance the pipeline.

In 2017, World Wildlife Fund (WWF) Uganda published a report warning that the pipeline "is likely to lead to significant disturbance, fragmentation, and increased poaching within important biodiversity and natural habitats" that are home to species including chimpanzees, elephants, and lions.

Wildlife forced from natural habitats by oil development has in turn caused severe disruptions to farming families.

"We have always had a problem of human-wildlife conflict in this village, but with drilling and road construction across the park, the invasions are more frequent," Elly Munguryeki, a farmer living just outside Murchison Falls National Park, told South Africa's Mail & Guardian earlier this month.

"We keep reporting the losses to park authorities but nothing happens," said Munguryeki. "Each night a herd of buffalo, baboons, and hippos from the park would invade my farm and neighboring plots and eat our crops until dawn. Whatever they left would be eaten by baboons and wild pigs during the day, forcing us to harvest premature crops."

A 2020 Oxfam report noted the EACOP "will cross poor, rural communities in both Uganda and Tanzania that lack the political and financial capital of the project stakeholders... The lopsided complications of this power dynamic are well-documented in similar extractive industry projects," the report stated. "Powerful companies are often able to hide their operations behind local contractors and permissive government authorities. Often the only hope that local communities have for remediation or justice is through local government bodies that are often weak, fragile, or captured by corporate and national interests."

Mary, an Ugandan farmer in Rakai near the Tanzanian border who was interviewed for the report, said that "when this pipeline project came, they promised us too many things. Up to now they have done nothing...What makes me worried is that they took my land but I have not yet been compensated," she claimed.

A community member from Rujunju village, Kikuube District in Uganda told the report's authors that, "The government and oil companies have not informed us about the negative impact that the EACOP will have on our well-being. All they tell us are good things that the EACOP will bring like roads and jobs. We also want to know the negative impact of the pipeline so that we can make informed decisions."

Plastic Planet = Plastic People

By Stephen Leahy, Canada Need to Know: June 3, 2021

I've done many articles on plastic pollution – including some of the first ones on microplastics in the oceans and in the remotest parts of our increasingly plastic planet. Plastic is up there with climate change in term of its threats to the health and well being of our home and you and I. (The same petrochemical companies are behind both.)

Here are some brief need-to-knows:

Need-to-Know 1: Plastic is just a form of fossil fuel. Your plastic water bottle, your grocery bag, your foam tray full of cucumbers ... they're all made from oil or

natural gas. It takes lots of energy to make that happen.

Need-to-Know 2: If the plastics industry was a country it would be the 4th largest carbon polluter, after China, the U.S., and India.

Need-to-Know 3: Global demand for plastics is expected to increase by some 22% over the next five years.

Need-to-Know 4: Just 9% of plastic has ever been recycled a 2017 study shows. Recycling plastic is expensive compared to making virgin plastic. The plastics industry might be the world's most wasteful industry.


Need-to-Know 5: Nearly every piece of plastic ever made still exists in some

form today. Fish have been swallowing microplastics since the 1950s and the concentration of microplastics in their guts has increased over time new research shows. There were no plastic particles in fish gullets before mid-century according to researchers at Chicago's Field Museum where they have some two million fish specimens dating back to 1900.

Need-to-Know 6: 15 million tons of plastics enter the ocean every year according to the latest estimate.

Need-to-Know 7: Rich countries export the majority of their plastic waste to poorer countries.

The U.S. ships most of its plastic waste **Plastics** *continued on next page*

to Malaysia since China no longer takes it. Customs officials in Senegal, Africa recently seized a container with 25 tons of plastic waste from Germany.

Need-to-Know 8: Single-use plastics account for over a third of plastics produced every year.

Just 20 petrochemical companies led by ExxonMobil, Dow, and China's Sinopec produce over 50 per cent of all single-use plastic a new report reveals. Leading banks like Barclays, HSBC, and Bank of America provide the funding.

Need-to-Know 9: Lower oil prices in recent years has made plastic production more profitable.

With the shift to renewable energy and electric vehicles, the oil industry is now pivoting to plastics and investing \$ billions to increase production.

Plastic Planet = Plastic People

That's probably more than you wanted to know but bear with me for one more. Plastic pollution isn't just ugly, it's dangerous. Plastics, microplastics, and nanoplastics have been in found inside nearly every living thing including plants and the placentas of unborn babies.

Yes, you and I are now partially, and unwillingly, made of plastic.

How dangerous is this for us? No one knows. There's lots of research ongoing: One medical researcher spoke of her preliminary results about effects of microplastic particles on human immune system :

"...provokes an inflammatory response within the body, one wherein the immune system makes and directs more immune cells towards microplastics."

Need-to-Know 10: Plastic particles are now found inside nearly every living thing including the unborn.

Here's some good news. There is some progress in dealing with plastics.

Across Africa, 34 countries have banned or taxed single-use plastics, according to the United Nations. China and India plan to phase them out by 2022. Canada has set a target of zero-plastic waste by 2030 and plastic is now considered toxic under Canada's primary environmental law. A coalition of oil and chemical companies including Imperial Oil Ltd., Dow Chemical Canada, and Nova Chemicals Corporation have sued the Canadian government over this.

Australia's Minderoo Foundation is launching an intriguing scheme to get plastic manufacturers to pay a voluntary financial contribution for every ton of new plastic they make. For example a virgin plastic tariff of U.S. \$200 per ton and, for the most difficult to recycle plastics, could be up to US \$5,000 per ton. By increasing the cost of virgin plastic it should greatly increase the collection and use of recycled plastics. The Foundation is committing U.S.\$300 million to set the whole thing up.

What you can do about plastic pollution? Aim for a zero waste lifestyle. Impossible? Maybe, but I've interviewed a young millennial who downsized her yearly trash pile so it literally fits inside an eight-ounce jar. And also a suburban family who put out only one bag of trash a year. They provided some very helpful tips in this *National Geographic* article I wrote in 2018: https://www.nationalgeographic. com/science/article/zero-waste-familiesplastic-culture.

Five Principles of Zero-Waste From the Experts*

L Refuse: Refuse to buy things with lots of packaging.

3. Reduce: Don't buy things you don't really need.

3. **Reuse**: Repurpose worn out items, shop for used goods, and purchase reusable products like steel water bottles.

4. Compost: Up to 80 percent of waste by weight is organic. But this rarely decomposes in landfills.

5. Recycle: It still takes some energy and resources to recycle, but it's better than sending stuff to the landfill or allowing it to become litter.

Bright Green Lies: How the Environmental Movement Lost Its Way and What We Can Do About It

We are long out of time to break through our cultural denial about this fact: No technology is neutral. "An industrial society,"

We have written this book because life has been broken and is now fast draining away through the cracks. The cultures that have done that breaking need to be abandoned and their ruling sociopaths dethroned. Make no mistake, this will require a serious and dedicated resistance movement. It will also require an unsentimental understanding of which human activities constitute that breaking,

...Assigning dollar values to living oceans or rivers or other natural communities presumes dollar values can mimic real values – that is, the intrinsic values of the oceans, rivers, or natural communities, and the relationships between all of these. For me to assign a dollar value to, say, a river, presumes I know what that river's value is (or else I can at least guess at it), and, more importantly, that this value can be in any reasonable way represented by a dollar amount – which, of course, is nonsensical and arrogant.

How can I know the full value of salmon to a forest or the full value of phytoplankton, who provide oxygen for two out of three of animal breaths? How can I know the full value of wind on a hilltop or tidal energy to oceans or sunshine to a desert? How can I know the full value of prairie dogs to prairies, or even shadows of their full values? Why can't we just accept that prairies and prairie dogs know best their value to each other?

For capitalists to assign dollar values to the lives of others presumes capitalism has the capacity to assign accurate value to these others. But if someone paid you a trillion dollars for all the phytoplankton in the world, what would you (or any other animal) breathe? In fact, if we assign dollar values to "ecosystem services" provided by the natural world, no sector of the industrial economy would be profitable. None. Not even the coal, oil, and gas sectors. Not one of them.

The industrial economy is based on systematic theft from land bases, and the conversion of these living communities into dead products. That's what an industrial economy is. The economy does not create value for the real world: It destroys the real world. Let's say your community has been invaded by a terrifying occupier. It doesn't matter who the invader is. It could be anyone from the Romans to the Imperial British to the Nazis to capitalists to space aliens to conspiracy theorist David Icke's Lizardmen. These conquerors install a violent and exploitative extractive economy (sorry for the redundancy, but, once again, all extractive economies are violent and exploitative). They perceive you and everyone else in your community as inferior to them, and of less value.


Indeed, none of you has any inherent value whatsoever; you are valued only to the degree that you're useful to the occupiers.

The crassest occupiers place value on you only insofar as they can convert you directly into cash. If they value your labor, they'll enslave you or pay whomever owns you for this labor. If you have no value to them as a laborer, they'll put monetary values on other ways they can use you. Can they sell your flesh for food? Can your skin be made into jackets? Can your fat be made into soap? Can your teeth be carved into trinkets, or your bones be made into fertilizer? Can your body be used for housing? Can you be burned or otherwise exploited for fuel? Each of these uses adds value, and those values are determined by the overlords. Your value is not determined by you or by those you love, those who love you, or other members of your community.

But why would you put a financial value on yourself anyway? And why, unless you're a sociopath, would you name a financial value for any other member of your community? For how many pieces of silver would you sell your mother?

The slightly more sophisticated of the occupiers recognize that it's possible for you to serve them in ways that can't be immediately monetized, so they'll put dollar values on your "ecosystem services" instead. For example, if your poop can fertilize the soil they're using to grow their crops, then they'll tolerate you being on their agricultural fields so long as you only poop but do not eat their cash crops or otherwise interfere with them.

Because the occupiers are inflicting an extractive economy on your community, it begins to crumble. In fact, your community-crumbles so much that it begins to interfere with the occupier's ability to exploit and, ultimately, the occupier's economy....

How my late grandmother, Veronica Isieke, defended the rights of rural women to own land and feed families

My late grandmother, Veronica Isieke (photo at right), was born in 1916 and died in 1997. During her time she was among the few women who made an impact in the community. She was a visionary and resilient person who believed that women's voices should be heard and be allowed to contribute to community development.

She didn't want to see her right or that of her fellow women trampled. This didn't mean she disrespected the male folks or her husband, but her measuring scale was equity and justice.

She came from a landlocked region where men believed that women do not have a right to own land. This became an issue after the demise of her late husband as family men pushed her with threats to give up all her late husband's land property now under her possession.

"You dare not try Veronica," some would say

When she saw that what was perceived

as the dominant culture was going to rob her of her human rights and no one among the men was willing to stand by her, she employed every legitimate means and insisted not even a plot was removed from her land.

As a farmer who practiced on a subsistence level, her survival and ability to create income depended on how much land was available and her capacity to manage that land.

When soil erosion forced many to abandon their farmlands as their crops were consistently washed away by the rain, my grandmother introduced a plant that is widely used today to prevent erosion on farmlands.

Many who left their land began to come back as they now have a solution to the ecological problem in the community. This amplified food security and reduced deforestation, as the same tree can produce firewood for home use, thereby preserving the forest trees.

Growing under the watch of a focused, fearless, and nature-friendly grandmother contributed largely to my love for nature and belief that women have a right that should be preserved and respected.

Remembering her on this #InternationalWomensDay has further motivated and strengthened my quest to pursue those values for which she was known.

Today, I see Veronica written on the face of each of her female grand- and greatgrandchildren. I also hear and read her when they speak or act, and I smile with nostalgia and say that is my grandmom.

She was a woman who motivated many rural women, especially widows, to own and protect their land, and to have enough food and income to feed their families.
